Breastmilk for centuries has been the preferred method of nutrition for infants; however, preterm babies are not receiving the benefits that full-term babies are getting. According to Terek et al., (2015), breastmilk for premature or sick newborns is vital in the prevention of "feeding intolerance, necrotizing enterocolitis, and systemic infections" (185). In addition to these benefits, breastmilk also provides necessary growth factors for the baby to fully develop. Not only are neonates suffering from not obtaining breastmilk, mothers are suffering from not being able to provide it. Mothers in the NICU who are not supported and kept informed with breastfeeding have a "60% higher risk of developing postpartum depression" (Shattanawi, 2017, 391). With there being a magnitude of benefits from breastfeeding for both the mother and the baby, the question comes to why is it not a common practice for the mothers who have babies in the NICU. What are the main environmental, emotional, and physiological barriers preventing mothers from breastfeeding or providing breastmilk for their babies in the neonatal intensive care unit, and why is it crucial to overcome these barriers to prevent serious complications for

This project is the creation and sustained growth of a chapter of the Food Recovery

Network at Western Kentucky University. This project seeks to reduce the food waste produced on WKU's campus while helping the wider community of Bowling Green. Food waste is a

global issue with both social and environmental ramifications. In the United States, over 30% of the food that is produced is wasted ("America's Food Waste Problem"). At the same time, 11.1% of Americans were food insecure in 2018, meaning that they were unable to provide all of the food that they needed at some point during the year (Coleman-Jensen et al.). When food waste is sent to landfills, it emits a lot of methane, a potent greenhouse gas, and removes nutrients and water from the ecosystem. The Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations estimates that 8% of all anthropogenic greenhouse gas emissions, or 4.4 gigatons of carbon dioxide equivalent, is generated by food waste ("Food Wastage Footprint & Climate Change" 1).

There are many better alternatives and uses for food waste than sending it to landfills.

The EPA has created a hierarchy of food recovery methods. The ideal first choice is reducing food waste at its source, followed by feeding surplus food to hungry people, feeding it to animals, using it for industrial uses, composting it, and finally, as a last resort, sending it to a landfill ("America's Food Waste Problem"). Many organizations have been created to address the problem of food waste through using surplus food to feed people in need. One such organization, the Food Recovery Network (FRN), is a network of over 200 chapters at universities and colleges across the United States. FRN chapters are comprised of student volunteers who recover surplus food from campus restaurants and deliver that food to

(Economics, CE) My project is to establish Nice Food, a nonprofit, pay-it-forward food truck where everyone can eat regardless of their ability to pay, aiming to sustainably alleviate the weight of poverty.

(English, CE) Unlike the most common types of queer literature, my novel will not focus on finding an identity and coming out because many queer people do not wish to relive these experiences. Instead, [title of novel] will be a fantasy story that any demographic can relate to because of its message of hope and redemption, and the main characters happen to be queer.

(Performing Arts, CE) Through research, writing, and performance of solo theatre, I will explore the person of Joan of Arc. I will dive into the narratives of her that exist and shape a fuller portrait of the woman remembered today to show the subjectivity of historiography and the complexities of humanity.

(Psychology/Org. Leadership, Thesis) Looking at the emotional intelligence component of leadership, I am seeking to explore how self-awareness and empathy, gained through Enneagram personality training, will affect leadership abilities.

(Political Science, Thesis) This project aims to answer the question: "(a) what factors influence U.S. deportations, and (b) what factors influence U.S. public opinion on deportation," which will be answered through individual-level deportee data, macro deportation trends, and original public survey data from both the United States and Mexico.

Approach/Methodology

Thesis Example

An analysis of Supreme Court opinions will ascertain the national standard or precedent for utilizing no-knock warrants. Supreme Court oral arguments and opinions, addressing the legality of no-knock warrants, will tell the general history of such law enforcement policies. While the constitutionality of no-knock warrants is widely recognized, the methods for executing such warrants is disputed. This issue is particularly prominent in the execution of a no-knock warrant by the LMPD, resulting in Breonna Taylor's death. An in-depth study of Ms. Taylor's case provides relevant insight on the present necessity and legitimacy of no-knock warrants, considering how the practice endangers civilians and police officers alike. Ms. Taylor's death in March 2020 was one of many incidents characterized as police brutality, sparking national outrage. A national public opinion survey is an opportunity to assess opinions on no-knock warrants after the immediate resulting outrage. Specifically, what are current opinions on no-knock warrants and when are they acceptable or necessary? A national survey, involving human participation, would require IRB Approval and CITI Program Certification.

For my CE/T project, I have developed a landscape plan that not only works harmoniously with the existing front yard plants that are well-established (i.e. two boxwood bushes and a magnolia tree), but also utilizes various garden structures (such as trellises and raised beds) and incorporates many perennial plants. I have extensively researched—and

continue to research—sustainable growing methods and practices that are best suited for small spaces like that of the Office of Sustainability. Every plant included in my landscape plans will be edible in some way. All plants/seed will be USDA Certified Organic and/or heirloom cultivars (cultivated varieties) that are appropriate for local growing conditions. Plants/seed will be sourced as locally as possible. Since the existing bermudagrass sod lawn does not serve an edible purpose, and, in fact, is an invasive species, I will attempt to eradicate it by covering the lawn with layers of compost, cardboard, and leaf mulch before planting. Throughout the project establishment period, Project Grow fellows assist me in planting, as well as constructing structures to be used throughout the landscape.

The gathered data is expected to provide an easily accessible and observable depiction of the detriments non-communicative styled teaching can have on language learners.
